





Supervisors Minute Books 1870 – 1972: The Business of Life in Prince William County

County Supervisors dealt with all aspects of the business of life in Prince William County. The Supervisors Minute Books (Minutes), which began in October 1870, provide abundant detail and, at times, intimate glimpses into the circumstances of individual residents. They are an important primary source of local information on numerous topics ranging from social welfare to the opening and closing of roads and construction of bridges. In the absence of local newspapers these records are especially significant. Early issues of *The Manassas Gazette*, which began publication in 1869, were destroyed in the fire which swept through Manassas in December 1905. From the Supervisors Minute Books, we know that D.W. Whiting published *The Prince William Advocate* in 1870¹, but no copies of the newspaper are extant.

The Minutes reflect the complexities which characterized the progress of life in the county as the population

grew (from 7,504 in 1870 to 111,102 in

1970²) and chronicle the Supervisors' reactions to local events and state initiatives affecting life in the County. Eventually an administrative bureaucracy evolved to serve the needs of the rapidly growing population. The Minutes record the workings of local agencies which administered safety, health, education, leisure, transportation and welfare services. At the same time, while they contain fewer personal details about ordinary individuals, they still make social commentary and react to contemporary events.

The Board of County Supervisors was established by the Virginia Constitution of 1869. Beginning in 1870, members were elected by townships annually in May, to qualify by the following July 1st. The Board held meetings as necessary, with a mandatory annual meeting on the first Monday in December.³ In 1874, magisterial districts replaced townships and township supervisors became the district supervisors.⁴ As a result of the Virginia State Convention of 1901/02, and beginning in January 1904, all county officials were elected in November. County Supervisors served four year terms beginning the following January 1st. The board was to hold meetings at fixed periods, and as often as was necessary.⁵

The Board of Supervisors met at the Brentsville Court House from 1870 through 1893. The first meeting at the new Manassas Court House was held on January 6, 1894.⁶ From 1870 to 1967 there were six magisterial districts, whose names remained unchanged: Brentsville, Coles, Dumfries, Gainesville, Manassas and Occoquan. In February 1967, a majority of rearrangement/redistricting commission members agreed on the boundaries for a seventh magisterial district, which Francis M. Coffey had petitioned the court for ten years earlier. Mr. Coffey was appointed Supervisor of the Neabsco Magisterial District in February 1967, and new boundaries were created for the remaining six districts to meet continuous increase in population.⁷

In response to a court order requiring them to do so, the BOCS adopted a new redistricting plan on June 12, 1975. The adopted plan, a modification of a proposal submitted by Dumfries District Supervisor Andrew J. Donnelly, contained seven magisterial districts, two in western Prince William and five in populous eastern Prince William County. The name Manassas District was

dropped and a new district named “Woodbridge” was incorporated into the plan.⁸ As a result of a contractual agreement between Prince William County and the new City of Manassas, the Manassas Magisterial District was represented by a county supervisor through December 31, 1975.⁹ (Manassas and Manassas Park became separate cities prior to June 1, 1975.)

In November of 1991, citizens of Prince William County elected Kathleen K. Seefeldt as the first Chairman-at-Large (and eighth member) of the BOCS, a position she held until December 1999.¹⁰ Sean T. Connaughton, the present Chairman-at-Large, unseated Mrs. Seefeldt in November, 1999, ending her twenty-four year tenure on the BOCS. (Mrs. Seefeldt served as Occoquan District Supervisor from 1976 – 1991.)

A historic list of BOCS members, as recorded in the Minutes (1870 – 1972) and Prince William County government and local news publications (1972 – 2004) follows. (The official records often list supervisors only by their first and middle initials. If a supplementary document identified an individual as a supervisor and provided a full first and/or middle name, that information has been added in the Notes column.) RELIC welcomes additional information about, and photos of, BOCS members and other historic county government officials.

DID YOU KNOW?

A colonial resident of Prince William County is regarded as the father of the American “chain-store.” Alexander Henderson (1738-1815) came from Scotland to Virginia about the year 1756. He established a successful general store in Dumfries, with branches at Colchester (in Fairfax County), Occoquan, and Alexandria. His home in Dumfries, built about 1785, is still a local landmark. One of his sons, Archibald Henderson (1783-1859) became fifth commandant of the United States Marine Corps, serving from 1820 until his death. [DLW]

GOLDEN WEDDING OF MR. AND MRS. WALTER

Couple Were Married in Virginia
--- Mrs. Walter a Sister of
Mrs. J. R. Hornbaker.

(From the Easton, Pa., Express)

Two of the happiest people in Northampton county yesterday were Mr. And Mrs. Charles Walter. Surrounded by their children and grandchildren, they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary at their home in Palmer township, near Bushkill Park. The day was spent in a happy family gathering and bounteous dinner and supper were served. Mr. And Mrs. Walter are in excellent health. A large golden cake, beautifully decorated and bearing the inscription, "50th Anniversary," graced the table. Mr. And Mrs. Walter were presented with a handsome bouquet of yellow chrysanthemums.

The couple were married at Nokesville, Va., the bridegroom being a son of Mr. And Mrs. Jacob Walter, of this county, and his bride a daughter of Mr. And Mrs. Noah Hixson, of Nokesville. Mrs. Walter's home was in the centre of activities during a long period of the Civil War and day after day the opposing armies seesawed in that neighborhood, one day the Federal troops being in possession of her father's farm, the next day being driven off by the Confederate forces. Describing the scenes of those stirring times to her children and grandchildren, Mrs. Walter referred to the location of her home as "No Man's Land." Of course that term was not known in those days, but since its investion during the World War, she applied it with equal force to her description of her home in Civil War days. Several of her brothers were sent North to school and the Confederates accused her father of fostering sympathies for the Union. He was thrown into Libby Prison, but after a long legal battle was liberated. Later he was kidnapped at night and spirited 300 miles from home. He was forced to walk back.

For many years Mr. Walter was in the milling business and continued until his plant along the Bushkill creek was destroyed by fire in August 1916. Since then he has lived retired. He is one of the county's staunchest citizens and keeps in constant touch with the doings of the day. Sixty years ago he began reading the Easton Express and has kept at it faithfully and consistently ever since.

The guests at the golden wedding celebration were Mr. And Mrs. William Walter, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Walter and children, Martha, Christine and Donald; Mr. and Mrs. Earl Walter and daughter Lorena, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Walter and Miss Elizabeth Seifert, all of Easton and its vicinity.

1860 FEDERAL SLAVE SCHEDULE PRINCE WILLIAM COUNTY, VIRGINIA

Abstracted by Beverly Remza Veness

The Federal slave schedules exist for the census years of 1850 and 1860 and were conducted separate from the free population schedules. Although the individual name of the slave is not reported, his or her age, sex and race (Black or Mulatto) is given along with the owner's name. Other information given if applicable are whether they are "Fugitives from the State", "Number manumitted", "Deaf & dumb, blind, insane or idiotic" and the "number of Slave houses (this question is not asked in the 1850 Slave schedule.)" The Federal census for 1790 and 1800 are not available for Prince William County but with the 1810-1840 census, Slave owners were asked how many Slaves they have without detailed information as asked with the 1850 and 1860 Slave Schedule.

There are thirty-two pages of this 1860 Slave Schedule for Prince William County [*National Archives microfilm M653, roll 1396 available at Bull Run Regional Library in RELIC and also online on the library's Electronic Resource 'AncestryPlus'.*] Since the various districts within Prince William County are not indicated on the Schedule, the names on the list will remain as reported by page number so you may identify neighbors. In order to abstract the entire schedule within this issue and the issue in July 2004, there will be three running columns giving the information. First given will be the Slave owner. The underlined number after the name of the Slave owner is the "number of Slave houses" owned. The next lines will be the number of slaves (each line given the number 1), followed by the age of the Slave (infant ages are given as fractions, e.g. 8/12, meaning 8 months old), sex of the Slave and race of the Slave. Any other information will also be given.



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A copy of the Marriage bond 1850 between William L. Garrison and Ann E. R. Anis was given to RELIC by Scott Parham, Courthouse Archives Volunteer. He found the bond in Judgments, 1849-51: 1850 folder. This is the only known original marriage bond surviving for Prince William County. [DLW]

Written transcript:

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That we *William L. Garrison and Henry M. Jones* are held and firmly bound unto the Commonwealth of Virginia in the just and full sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, for the payment whereof well and truly to be made, we bind ourselves, our heirs, executors and administrators, jointly and severally, firmly by these presents. Sealed with our seals and dated this 1st day of *April* 1850.

THE CONDITION OF THE ABOVE Obligation is such, That whereas a marriage is intended to be had and solemnized between the above bound *W^m L. Garrison and Ann E. R. Anis* of the County of Prince William ; now, if there is no lawful cause to obstruct said marriage, then the above obligation is to be void, else to remain in full force and virtue.

[Notes: The following cases in the appellate court concern boundary disputes between William Tebbs and John Barron, and between John Lawson and John Hammitt, with a countersuit of Hammitt against John Crooke, Lawson's tenant. The first suit includes a deposition from Philip Shaw (born ca. 1735). He describes a conversation he had with Henry Holtzclaw (1711-1778) regarding land sold by Holtzclaw's father (Jacob Holtzclaw, 1683-1760) to William Tebbs (1720-1813), apparently 300 acres.^{11,12} The deed appears to be lost, but is mentioned in a later deed dated 1760.¹³ A deed from Stone to Tebbs was recorded in Deed Book K (1746-49), p. 227, but that book is also lost. A surviving deeds index (surnames M-W, 1731-1827) provides the reference.¹⁴ This case provides a clue to the tract's location. The land of John Barron is being leased by Thomas P. Thornton in 1796.
