

GOLDEN DAYS AT ANNABURG

Michael Gaines submitted the following narrative, a document transcribed by Peggy E. M. Portner, a cousin of Peter Valaer. Mr. Gaines' book, *The Shortest Dynasty, 1837-1947: the Story of Robert Portner; a History of His Brewing Empire; and the Story of His Beloved Annaburg* (Bowie, Md.: Heritage Books, 2002), is set for a second edition this summer. The Portner family mansion, Annaburg, is now a nursing home in Manassas. DW

In writing his memoirs, Peter Valaer (1886-1974) fondly recalled some of his more memorable visits with his relatives in Manassas. Written in about 1969, Valaer recalls details of his uncle and aunt, Robert and Anna Portner, as well as his cousins as he and his brother spent summers with the family at Annaburg.

The son of Mrs. Portner's brother Peter, Valaer spent many years in the Washington, D.C. area working in the field of science. A graduate of the University of North Carolina, he worked with his cousin Edward Portner developing a type of ink for the Department of Treasury, and later as a chemist for the U.S. Government. Valaer was quite knowledgeable of wines, having written a book on the chemistry of wine, in addition to writing numerous papers and reports on narcotics for the government.

One of Valaer's last jobs was as a teacher at the Woodward School in Washington. He is recalled as being a very kind and gentle man who loved science and would keep a class of students enthralled with little experiments. Peter Valaer died in May 1974 and is buried in the vicinity of Washington, D.C. MG



When I was a small boy, about 1902, still in high school, my brother, Paul, and I were invited to visit my

Aunt Anna (Mr. Robert Portner and family) at their summer home in Manassas, Virginia. It took almost my last cent I had saved from working in the tobacco factory in Winston Salem, N. C. to get there. I arrived first in Washington, D. C., my first visit there. After a day of sight seeing in Washington I took the late afternoon Southern Railway train from Washington to Manassas. The railway station was at that time just off Pennsylvania Avenue. I had a close financial shave there since the fare was one dollar and that was exactly all I had left.

I reached Manassas in the evening and stayed at The Prince William Hotel in Manassas near the railway station, owned by the Portners. My brother, Paul, had also just arrived and was there also. He came from Raleigh, N. C. Someone came for us in the morning to

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bring Paul, Me, and the baggage to the Portner Estate, named Annaburg, the estate with its spacious

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
mansion and broad acres. There for the first time Paul and I met our Portner cousins, originally 13 in number. All of them were there except Alma and Robert, the oldest boy and girl. Alma was then married to a St. Louis brewer and Robert II was deceased. Also one of the twins was ill. Eddie, the oldest, came down to Manassas on week-ends only. He was president of the Robert Portner Brewing Co. in Alexandria, Virginia. The Portner estate included about 2,000 acres taking in a large portion of the Bull Run battlefield. There was on the Portner estate some large special areas and larger barns for raising shetland ponies, and blooded horses, mostly of the hunter type. There were each year during summer a series of horse shows around Virginia and one each year in Manassas where the Portners were hosts. They won more than their share of cups and gold medals. There was also a stock farm on the estate. Also there was a deer park, a dense wooded are[a] and a lake stocked with bass in the deer park. We saw many deer, quite wild and wild turkeys, quail and other game.

Near the mansion was a swimming pool and also a lake with fish and swan, with canoes. The estate contained a number of historic spots which had been Union and Confederate headquarters. Near the home was a stone castle resembling the castles on the Rhine, was used mostly as a museum. Bits of cannons and cannon balls and other residue of the battlefield near-by which had been dug up by farm machinery. There was also a complete dairy farm "The Valaere Creamery."

I[t] was a wonderful experience for Paul and me to enjoy these wonders, quite unusual to us. There was a vineyard with various grapes and a small but efficient winery. One of the Portner wines had won a gold medal at the World's Fair (see special report on this) [not given with this copy]. Paul and I had a wonderful time with the boys and girls and some of their Washington visitors. We stayed nearly all that summer. I left for home about a month before high school, but Paul stayed until about college time which was his first year at A & M College (now N. C. State of U. N. C.) Aunt Anna had to pay my way back home as I didn't have one cent all the time I was in Manassas nor did I need any. Uncle Robert Portner was in Manassas at that time but he was very sick nearly all the time. I had a number of nice talks with him. He was a very inspiring and truly great man and he was loved and admired by everyone, particularly in Alexandria, Virginia, where he was rated as one of their finest citizens, during years of building up the Robert Portner Brewing Company and his other projects. It was said that when as a very young man coming from his home in Germany to America, young Robert Portner

threw his few remaining coins overboard; he said he would begin his career in the United States without one cent, but by hard, hard work and fine character he built up the Robert Portner Brewing Company in Alexandria on St. Asaph Street. In his early beer garden near the brewer he waited on the garden customers himself. His beer was famous and he could hardly make it fast enough. The original Portner home was a walled in, with large garden a spacious brick house on Washington Street in Alexandria where most of his older children were born. The brewing company grew and grew and was one of the finest breweries in that far south. They built their own refrigerator cars - and they shipped beer in kegs and bottles to all parts of the south. Their main brand was "Tivoli" (I love it spelled backward). It was here that Robert Portner, with his oldest son, Robbie, invented the air conditioning machinery, obtaining a U. S. patent on the process, the first commercial application of this principle in America. Robert Portner, II, the son, put in all the lighting fixtures in the plant, the brewery and bottling plant. He had previously graduated from the Massachussets [sic] Institute of Technolo[gy] in Boston, with high scholastic honors. He also did all of the electrical engineering for the Portner Apartment in Washington, D.C.

Robert Portner built his large apartment house (The Portner) in Washington at 15th and U & V Streets next to St. Pauls Catholic Church where "Mom" was baptized. There the talented Robbie put in all the heating and lighting. It was one of the apartments with dining rooms and one of the leading apartment houses in D. C. Over the years as that area become almost wholly negro it was sold to a Negro Company and renamed The Dunbar and is still operating today. In those early days before 1900 this was the outskirts of the city of Washington which over the years has extended into Maryland. When Paul and I came to visit the Portners during the summers, there was always a room reserved for us at The Portner. There we often saw Eddie Portner – he was during our day the Manager of the apartments and at the death of his father he became President of The Robert Portner Brewing Company.

Let's go back to Manassas – those were the golden days for the Portners – their visitors, horse shows with socially prominent people from Washington and Virginia coming to Annaburg. All of the girls "came out" in Washington society one by one. The boys, Alvin, Paul, Oscar, Herman, and the girls, Etta, Anna, Hilda and Elsa were there. The younger girls, Hilda and Elsa, had a governess, Miss Norcross, a highly refined and educated and very beautiful young lady. Always at the table was a special "German Butler" who expected

you to ask for things in German. On the grounds was an imported German landscaper. Taking care of the barns housing the blooded spirited hunters and ponies was a special corps of stablemen and helpers. There was also a vast vegetable garden.

It may not be amiss to describe briefly how we spent the days during the summer in Manassas. There were of course daily swimming and canoeing on the lake and grounds and fishing and tennis. The swan took exception to our being on their land and pecked us on the back. Once when Paul was driving them off with a paddle we overturned the canoe which dumped Paul and me into the lake. A very tall boy from Manassas used to come to swim at Annaburg; he was over seven feet tall. Also a Manassas policeman came to swim. He was Manassas' only cop and he never made an arrest. He was known as the "bull" (he was one of the Portner's best friends in Manassas). Will Meredith, the Virginia Congressman's son, came also to swim but mainly to see Etta whom he married. He became very important to the Portner family, especially after Mr. Portner died, and Aunt Anna depended on him very

much. When on weekends during Manassas' horseshow time groups of Washington visitors came to Annaburg, the younger boys including my Brother, Paul and I, Oscar and Herman, went to sleep in the game room on the top floor of the mansion, among the pool tables and other game equipment. Everyday and on Sundays we went to meet the trains bringing the newspapers and to see the people. One fourth of July one of the boys brought from Washington a car full of fireworks, mostly Roman Candles. With these we had Roman Candle bottles. Fortunately none of us got hurt.

When Mr. Robert Portner died, all the management of the large Manassas estate was in the hands of Aunt Anna. It was truly a difficult thing to control it with its many angles, and the large family, some of them minors.

When Aunt Anna died I was a Pall Bearer. The service was held during a heavy downpour of rain. Dr. Lyman Pearce of the All Soul's Church of Washington presided. Aunt Anna was buried in the private family cemetery in Manassas, where all of the family afterwards were buried. After Aunt Anna's death the Portner estate in Manassas disintegrated, piece by piece each portion dissolved. It was the passing of one of the great show places of Virginia.

In the meantime prohibition closed the brewery. It was difficult to understand how a nourishing, healthful beverage would be classified as an intoxicating liquor.

After I finished college at A & M (now N. C. State) Eddie wanted me to help him do lab work on his thesis for his PhD at M.I.T., but in the meantime he was also involved in the manufacturing of a pigment (Magnetic Pigment Co.) in Alexandria. There I worked as a chemist until Eddie sold the plant to Dr. Furman and moved it to Trenton, New Jersey. I went back into government service, Bureau of Soils, Bureau of Animal Husbandry and Internal Revenue, in all approximately 50 years. At this present writing I am 83 years old as this is being written at that time. I also went back to college to get my M.S. and work on my Doctor degree, but all college work then was in the evening.

After I had graduated from N. C. State and come to Alexandria, Virginia to do research work for Eddie to conclude his PhD from M.I.T. but with his manifold duties at the brewery and the apartment (The Portner) and number of other important things he had to look over – he had very little time to outline the work he wanted me to do on his thesis – but he was also very much interested in the manufacturing of the black pigment which was made in a loft over the Keg House of the brewery. I was the chemist and hard labor man. We sold the pigment to the U.S. Bureau of Engraving as one of the ingredients in printing paper money, and to Bauch & Lamb [sic] Optical Company in New York. Trying to do so much working nights, Saturdays and Sundays I made two bad “goofs”, once. I allowed the distilled water to overflow and it ran on some of the brewery office books and trying to do too many things, I let a batch of boiling pigment run over. It ran down to the Keg Room so I was in the dog house for a while. During these months I sometime visited the Manassas summer home, once with my father “Uncle Peter” who came to visit his sister, Aunt Anna. When I came to visit on a weekend the gardeners loaded me up with “green stuff”, fine vegetables from their gardens which was quite a treat for my boarding house in Washington.

Once Aunt Anna suggested I bring some of my friends to Manassas, so I brought George Moore, and we had a royal time. We did many things together with the boys and once when we went fishing at the deer park lake, we brought home a fine string of bass which was literally jumping in the lake. We used a few minnows and also bugs, grasshoppers, etc. Those hungry bass would bite on anything. That day the family and we had a nice bass for dinner. It seems the barn folks had hitched up one of their finest hunters “Silver Heels” for us. After fishing we found him violently pawing the ground anxious to leave and how we got home without being wrecked was a miracle – because we had to open and close gates on the way. In the evening we played cards with Hilda and the governess. Once my younger Brother Charles came to Manassas to visit the Portners.

Aunt Anna often spoke to us about her home in Switzerland where Dad and Uncle Christian and the others of that family were born. (Dad never went back but his sons and grandsons did.) Aunt Anna was born and lived in Yenaz. According to my theory of how Aunt Anna met Mr. Portner – according to my father Aunt Anna came to the U. S. to help him in his tavern business in High Bridge Mansion, Philadelphia. My father missed her very much as she was exceeding[ly] helpful in his business. It was

here she met Mr. Portner, and they were married in Philadelphia. Later my father moved to Winston Salem, N. C.

Aunt Anna was very proud of her family history in that Paul Valaer, one of our ancient relatives, as General of the Swiss Army saved Switzerland from the warlike Austrians. We have a coat of arms won by our ancestors and there is a Valaer chateau which stood for many years and still stands on the high hills of Sion. I visited it and so did Jack, Peter Valaer, III, and Betty – in 1968.

I have purposely avoided the events and marriages of the Portner family in order to concentrate on Annaburg, the lovely estate of the Portners in Manassas. Before I wind up my story of Annaburg I would like to say something about the handsome boys and beautiful girls of the Portner family. A number of them were sent to Germany to school so that they should learn the German language. Some of the boys went to Montclair, New Jersey, to preparatory school. Some went to V.M.I. and to the University of Virginia. Oscar and Herman were the two boys I knew best. I was about Oscar's age, perhaps a year or so younger. It was Oscar who I knew best and we often discussed plans about what we were going to do. Once he worked at the brewery off and on while I was working in the Ink factory. He was the nicest and kindest person I ever knew (like a brother). His sisters always said he was the sweetest of all their brothers and always so kind to them. I remember his wife "Molly" and their two fine sons, John and Robert Portner, III.

I will be ever grateful to the Portner family for their kindness and helping Paul and me to get a college education. I will always remember Aunt Anna's words: "Peter, hold your head up and be ever proud of your family because it has a noble background." That I intend to do.

The memories of the glories of "Annaburg" will always be with me gratefully to the end. I am perhaps the only one left who can now tell about the golden days of the Portners at Annaburg. Those days of yore will come no more, yet thro our manly years the thoughts of you so good so true shall fill our eyes with tears.

BRITISH MERCANTILE CLAIMS, 1775-1803
Claims relating to Prince William County Customers and/or Residents

Extracted and indexed by Margaret B. Binning

The properties of many British merchants operating in Virginia were confiscated during the Revolutionary War. Virginians often refused to pay debts that were owed to those stores. The peace treaty with Britain, 1783, allowed the merchants to sue in American courts for recovery of these debts. Beginning about 1800, special agents investigated persons owing the debts to determine their current status.

In a long series of articles published between 1962 and 1989 in *The Virginia Genealogist*, John Frederick Dorman prepared abstracts of British Mercantile Claims for the state of Virginia. Following is an index of persons who appear in those reports who were customers of Prince William firms, or were identified as Prince William residents at the beginning of the war.

Data extracted includes the customer's name, estimated date of death (if deceased), date the debt was due, current status of the debt (outcome), citation from *The Virginia Genealogist*, and the name of the creditor. For additional information, please see Mr. Dorman's abstracts which cite particular documents in the Public Record Office, London. DW

Compiler's notes on developing this Index of the articles that appeared in *The Virginia Genealogist*:

1. Death dates were estimated by subtracting from the date of the report if known otherwise subtracting from 1803, the latest date of the reports.
2. The term "then solvent" refers to being solvent at the time of death.
3. To facilitate search, multi-owner debtor company names are listed under the name of each owner and will therefore appear more than once in this index.
4. Square brackets "[]" reflect comments of the compiler.
5. See each *Virginia Genealogist* citation for reference to the original Treasury Papers series.

**DUMFRIES DISTRICT COURT
LAND CAUSES, 1793-1811**

Abstracted by William M. Balderson, Jr.

From 1789 to 1808, Virginia was divided into eighteen judicial districts, created by the General Assembly to handle common law cases that had become bogged down in the General Court in Richmond. One of those new courts was located at Dumfries, then the seat of justice for Prince William County. Its jurisdiction included Fairfax, Loudoun, and Fauquier Counties, as well as Prince William. The territory that became Alexandria County (Arlington) was also part of this region until it was transferred to the District of Columbia in 1791.

The records transcribed below by RELIC volunteer Bill Balderson are taken from a volume labeled **Land Causes, 1793-1811** (on Reel #35 of the court records of Prince William County). The original volume may be found at the Judicial Center in Manassas. The first surviving case seems to have been recorded about August 1794 (see page 11). This book follows a book labeled **Land Causes, 1789-1793**, which has been abstracted by Ruth and Sam Sparacio, and published by the Antient Press (1992) as *Abstracts of Land Causes, Prince William County, Virginia, 1789-1790 and 1790-1793*.

Land causes are lawsuits filed in order to correct problems with land titles or property boundaries. Both sides would submit documents to defend their arguments. Ancient deeds and wills, some going back into the 1600s, were transcribed into these record books. Today the original records may be lost, and this transcript may be the only surviving copy. The land cause series is therefore important for reconstructing the lost records of Prince William and adjacent counties (especially Stafford County). Another type of important record preserved here is the deposition. Elderly residents were brought into court to give their testimony about events that may have happened many years before. Their ages are often given (an important item in itself); their descriptions of past events are enlightening, and may give clues to family history.

There is an index in the front of this book, but it is not the original index, it is in a different writing style and the paper does not seem to be part of the original book. The index begins: "Index Land Causes 1795, 1808-1811".

The outer edges of the first several pages are worn/torn/broken, so that the page numbers and some of the text is not readable. The first page with a readable, original page number is page 20. Counting backwards from there, the first page in this book is page 9, thus the first 8 pages are missing.

The spelling has not been adjusted to modern usage in this transcription. Upper and lower case letters are represented as used in the original document.

Where a word can not be read because it is at the edge of a torn or mutilated page, Page Edge or **[PE]** is used to denote this. Where a word can not be read or interpreted, **[??]** is used to denote that word. Where a letter in a word can not be interpreted, * is used to denote each letter. Other notations within **[]** are used as needed to explain wording or blanks.

At a Court held for Prince William County the 1st day of July 1793" On a motion by Enoch Renoe it was ordered that William Alexander, William Grant, William Fitzhugh and James Watkins or any three of them view the most convenient way to open a road from Enoch Renoe's to the Dumfries Road by Richard Woe's and report both the conveniences and inconveniences to the Court.

The report on a road from Enoch Renoe's to the Dumfries Road by Richard Woe's was returned to the Court. Two possible routs were described. Mentions Law*[PE]* Jameson, David James, David Jameson, John M^cMillian, Capt. Richard Graham. David Jameson Jr. David Jameson Jr., John McMillian and Richard Graham summoned to December Court to answer why the road should not be opened.

"At a Court continued and held for *[PE]*

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"aforesaid County the 3rd Day of December 1793" It was ordered that James Jameson, Patty Jameson, Hebro*[PE]* Ralls, William Jameson, John M^cMillian & Richard Graham be summoned to the next court to show cause why a road from Enoch Renoe's to the Dumfries Road by Richard Wroe's should not be opened.

At a Court on 7 January 1794, James Jameson, Patty Jameson, William Jameson, John McMillian, Hebron Ralls and Richard Graham were represented by their attorney and objected to the subject road. It was ordered that a Writ adquod Damnum be issued to ascertain the damages to be caused by establishing the road. Writ to be executed 20 Inst. [Jan.]

At a Court held on 2 September 1794, a report from the Commonwealth of Virginia to the Sheriff of Prince William County stated that it appears the road from Enoch Renoe's to the Dumfries road by Richard Wroe's will go through the [lands] *[PE]*

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of James Jameson, Patty James, William Jameson, John McMillian, Hebron Ralls and Richard Graham, to which they severally object. The Sheriff was to appoint a panel of 12 freeholders to examine the proposed road site, estimate the possible damages and present a sealed report to the Justices of the Court by February next [1794]. "Witness Robert Graham Clerk of our said Court at the Court house this 10th day of January in the 18th year of the Commonwealth AD 1794."

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The panel reported on their review of the proposed road and subsequent damages. The report was presented by Hugh Atwell, deputy Sheriff. The Jury members were James Webster, John Edrington, John

Lansdown, Simon Luttrell, Benjamin Cooper, James Gwatkins, Spilsby Stone, Thomas Calvert, William Jackson, William Lynn, Robert Luttrell and Carty Wells. Their estimate of damages were:

The Court adjudged against the road being established. Whereupon Enoch Renoe prayed the Court for an appeal at the next Court.

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The Court granted Renoe's appeal request and set his security bond at \$300.00. Note at end of entry reads:

"Appellants cost	\$14.45
Appellees cost	\$ 2.98"

Bond of Enoch Renoe & Langhorne Dade for \$300.00 to James Jameson, Patty Jameson, William Jameson, Hebron Ralls, John M^cMillian & Richard Graham, dated 17 Sept. 1794.

"The Condition of the above obligation is such that Whereas on the second day of this instant (September) It was considered and ordered by the Court of Prince William County that a road from the said Enoch Renoes to the Dumfries road by Richard Wroes should not be established~"

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"from which determination the said Enoch Renoe upon motion had an appeal granted him to the next district Court to be holden in the Town of Dumfries. If therefore the said appellant **[PE]** shall according appear and prosecute the said appeal with effect at the said district court and perform the Judgment of the said Court and pay the Damages which the law shall give if cast in the said Appeal. Then the above obligation to be void else to remain in full force & Virtue"

Copies of the 1940's poll tax lists for Prince William County are kept in the manuscript holdings at RELIC. A photocopy of the lists has been made and bound. The bound copy can be found at VA 929.5273 Pri in RELIC. The listings give the person's name with a record of which years of the previous three that taxes were paid; thus the list in 1944 includes the fees paid for 1941-1944. The lists for the years 1944-1949 have been combined and provide a "census" of those who had paid their poll tax 1941-1949.

Reported districts in the Poll Tax Lists for Prince William County are Brentsville (*Prince William Reliquary, Vol. 1, no. 2*), Coles (*Prince William Reliquary, Vol. 1, no. 3*), Dumfries including Quantico Town (*Prince William Reliquary, Vol. 1, no. 4*), Manassas District (*Prince William Reliquary, Vol. 2, no. 1*) & Town of Manassas (*Prince William Reliquary, Vol. 2, no. 2*), Occoquan District & Town (*this issue*) and Gainesville (*next issue*).

If you see two middle initials indicated by a "or", it means recorded one year was one initial and on another year a different initial. It is unknown which one is a typo so I have left it in. All variant spellings of names have been recorded as well as any names added or crossed off.
